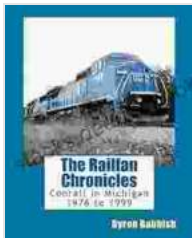


# The Railfan Chronicles: Conrail in Michigan 1976 to 1999

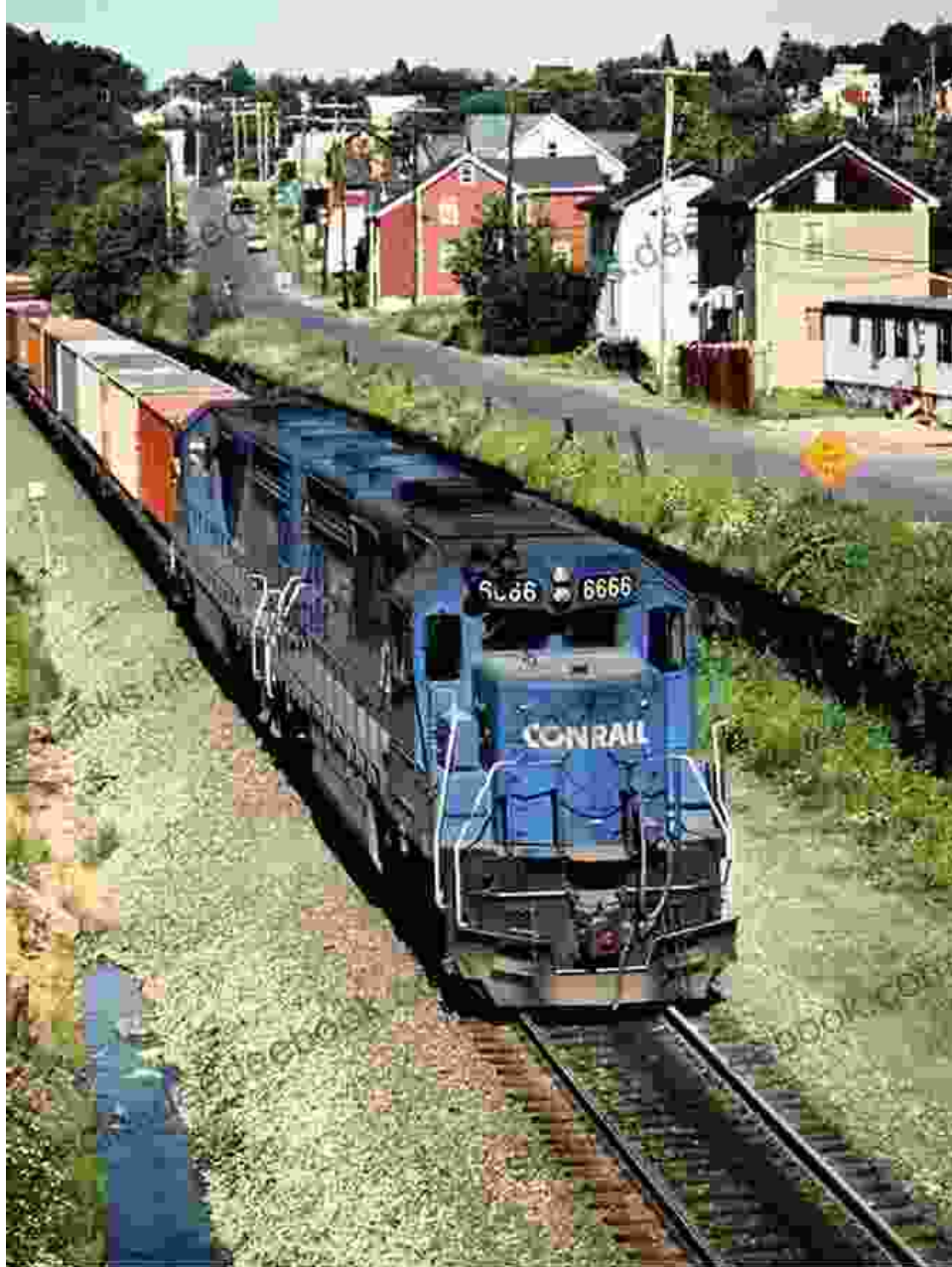

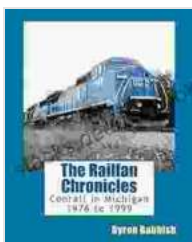

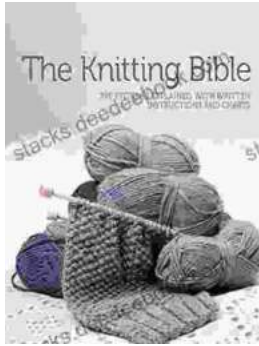
